Pastor's Pen

While visiting France this summer I squeezed in a 2-night visit to Geneva, Switzerland. Geneva was a refuge for French Protestants (known as Huguenots) when they experienced persecution during the 16th century. It was in Geneva that John Calvin preached and worked with the city council to live out the faith and practice of what would become the Reformed branch of the Protestant movement. On Sunday morning, I arrived at Calvin Hall, adjacent to John Calvin's church, St. Pierre's Cathedral, hoping to attend a Waldensian (Italian Protestant) worship service. (The Waldensian Church and the Reformed Church in America have a long-standing mission partnership.) I must have misread the sign as the door was locked, and the only *worship* sounds were coming from St. Pierre's Cathedral next door. Coming up the side steps I avoided the guides redirecting tourists who were looking for a historic tour and not a worship service. I entered the dark, cool, cavernous 850-year-old cathedral, and a greeter handed me a worship book as she unclipped the braided rope inviting me into the French language Protestant service. A multi-national congregation of maybe 150 sat in the pews. The minister,

wore a preaching robe with Genevan tabs (a type of preaching collar with two strips of white cloth forming an inverted V at the collar). She led us through a familiar liturgy in an unfamiliar language. Following her sermon, the congregation was invited forward to come forward and form a circle around the Lord's table at the base of the pulpit. I made my way forward, slowly, behind the man at the end of our pew who used crutches and braces. We formed one large misshapen circle, bulging out into the aisle behind the pulpit as room was made for one more and one more and one more. In a pew bordering our circle an older woman sat with her oxygen tank and a companion who might have been a grandson. All were graciously served by elders. The bread was served, *the body of Christ broken for you*. The tray of glass-thimble-cups filled with either wine or juice followed. Just as the older woman was about to be served the tray was empty. Servers quickly retreated to replace the tray. Fearing she would not be served, the woman grew anxious. Myself and others made silent gestures inviting patience. We also made faces that we hoped communicated an assurance that we could wait, we would all wait, until everyone was served. The server returned. She received her cup, as did the rest of us. *The blood of Christ shed for you*.

As I drank a shiver moved through me. Five hundred years prior a movement was taking shape in this space. It was five hundred years since a reformation began, calling the church to rethink Jesus, God, community and salvation. The Reformation travelled throughout Europe. From the Netherlands a branch arrived in the New Amsterdam (New York) in 1628, and in the 1840's another branch arrived in the land south of Chicago, Illinois. Their heir, I stood at this table with others yielding space in order to make room for the lame, the infirmed, the anxious, the afraid, the sad, the lonely waiting for all to arrive in the circle at the table, waiting for the cup to be replenished, waiting until all are served. I recalled Christ's instruction in Luke 14, "when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind."

Kingdom seeds were planted 500 years earlier. We are heirs of those seeds as we still shift and move and shuffle finding a way to welcome more into the circle of Christ's redeeming love.

Recipes- Cherry Tomato Salad

Ingredients

4 cups cherry or grape tomatoes, halved	1 & 1/2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
2 cups fresh mozzarella balls, halved	
1/4 cup red onion, diced	1/4 teaspoon sugar
1/4 cup chopped fresh herbs (basil, oregano, parsley)	1/4 teaspoon dried oregano
	1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
1/4 cup olive oil	Salt and pepper to taste

Place the tomatoes, mozzarella balls, red onion and herbs in a large bowl. In a small bowl, whisk together the olive oil, red wine vinegar, sugar, oregano, garlic powder, and salt and pepper to taste. Pour dressing over the tomato mixture and gently toss to coat evenly.

The Mission of the Month for September 2022 is Freehold CROP Hunger Walk that will take place on Sunday, October 16, 2022. The start location will be the Reformed Church of Freehold, 67 West Main Street, Freehold, NJ 07728. CROP Hunger Walks are community-based walk fundraising events held in cities and towns across the United States, created to support the global mission of Church World Service, a faith-based organization transforming communities around the globe through just and sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, displacement and disaster. After a CROP Hunger Walk ends, 25% of the funds raised is returned to the host community to support local hunger fighting efforts. The Crop Project began in 1947 when farmers were asked to donate food and seed crops to our hungry neighbors in post-World War II Europe and Asia. The first CROP Hunger Walks took place in Bismarck, North Dakota (1969), and York, Pennsylvania (1970). Since then, CROP Hunger Walk events have been held in hundreds of communities, large and small, raising millions of dollars to eradicate hunger and poverty.

The Mission of the Month for October 2022 is Freehold Area Open Door. Located at 39 Throckmorton Street, Freehold, NJ 07728, Open Door serves as a local food pantry in Freehold in addition to providing other services to those in need. A roster of member congregations support Open Door by providing a diverse and talented pool of volunteers. Some congregations also provide financial support, while others host volunteer events. Each congregation names a Trustee to the Board of Trustees. The Board meets six times a year, guiding the future of Open Door. Many Trustees actively participate in day to day operations or work on special programs. Donated food items can be placed at the front of the sanctuary on Sunday mornings or in a receptacle in the lobby. Financial gifts can be put in envelopes marked "Open Door" and included with the offering. Also, you can donate online using TITHE.LY. Open Door is a 501(c)(3) organization.
