

Favorite Recipes

Tomato Zucchini Casserole-Submitted by Amy Craven

1 1/2 cups grated cheddar cheese

1/3 cup parmesan cheese

1/2 teaspoon oregan o

1/2 teaspoon basil

2 cloves of garlic, minced

Salt and pepper to taste

2 medium zucchinis, thinly sliced

5 plum tomatoes, thinly sliced

1/4 cup butter

2 table spoons chopped onion

3/4 cup breadcrum bs



- 2.Mix the following in a bowl: Cheese Mixture: 1 1/2 cups grated cheddar cheese; 1/3 parmesan cheese; 1/2 tsp. oregano; 1/2 tsp. basil; 2 cloves garlic, minced; pinch of salt & pepper.
- 3. Thinly slice 2 medium zucchini and 5 plum tomatoes.
- 4-Arrange 1/2 the zucchini slices in the bottom of the baking dish; sprinkle with 1/4 of the cheese mixture; layer 1/2 the sliced tomatoes; sprinkle with 1/4 of the cheese mixture and repeat until finished.



5.Bread crumb t opping: Melt 1/4 cup butter in a small skillet; add 2 tablespoons of finely chopped on ion; cook until on ions are soft; stir in 3/4 cup breadcrum bs. Sprin kle on top.

6.Bake for 45 minutes covered loosely with foil; remove foil and bake another 25 minutes until top is browned.

Mulled Apple Cider-Submitted by Helen McKenzie



- 2 quarts a pple juice or sweet Cider
- 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
- i cinnamon stick
- teaspoon whole all spice
- 1 Teaspoon whole cloves



Mix apple juice (or cider) and sugar in a large saucepan; add spices. Heat mixture slowly over low heat to simmering. Cover saucepan and simmer for 20 minutes; strain and serve hot with a cinnam on stick in each mug. Store in a glass container, covered and refrigerated.

Pumpkin Whip Dip-Submitted by Lauren Redmond

1 package (3.4 ounces) instant butterscotch pudding mix

- 1-1/2 cups cold milk
- 1 cup canned pumpkin
- i teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- 1-1/2 cups whipped topping
- Gingersnaps, optional

In a large bowl, beat pudding and milk until well blended, 1-2 minutes. Blend in pumpkin and pie spice. Fold in whipped topping, spoon into dessert dishes. Chill. Garnish with ginger snaps if desired.
